Commodore's Log

Stuart Ullman Ah, the easy carefree life of a Whitbread sailor, I am thinking---it is January when you read this, and a cold, wet evening in December as I write. I am sitting inside Potowmack Landing, warming my body with the shelter of the building around me, and my spirits with a good frothy beer. Both of us, I think, are looking out at a damp winter, the air clammy and dense, the days short and darkened by thick clouds. We wish we could be sailing somewhere warm. Somewhere south. But that is just what the Whitbread racers are doing, isn't it? Leg 3 of the race, from Fremantle to Sydney, has just started in my time and leg 4, from Sydney to Auckland, will be underway in yours, but it amounts to the same thing: wonderful sailing around Australia, 50 or 60 degrees (which sounds tropical to me right now), with 15 to 25 knot winds. Sounds idyllic, doesn't it? A leisurely sail for those boats. Gentle. Lazy. Sailing in the Whitbread would be a blast, right? Nothing to it.

Well---to be fair I guess I should add that the race is not all skirting Australia in moderate winds. The Whitbread is the most grueling, difficult sailing race in the world, and perhaps the most grueling sports event of any kind. The local entry, Chessie Racing, sends daily reports which can be read on the Whitbread Chesapeake web page. (www.whitbread.org) Here are a few excerpts from the notes Grant "Fuzz" Spanhake, Watch Captain on Chessie Racing, sent home from leg 2, crossing the southern ocean toward Australia:

November 17: "The wind has shifted to the southwest, and kicked in to 24 knots. That means it is blowing off Antarctica. ... The water is like a fire hose at full speed, hitting you day and night.... Tonight we are expecting to be our coldest yet. I have everything I brought with me on, but even still my finger tips and feet are numb."

November 18th: "29 to 38 knots of wind, pitch black night, flying along... on the edge of control as passed the Kerguelens...as Chessie's crew battle on without feeling in their feet or fingers...Chessie's crew are only sleeping between 3 and 6 hours in every 24. This has been the case for nearly 5 days now, and it looks like there is no letting up in the near

future. Today we were blessed with two snow storms, along with a 38 knots squall...I'm off now to a soaking wet sleeping bag to try and grab an hour before I go on watch again."

November 20th: "There is no other feeling in the world like hurtling along at 20-25 knots of boat speed into inky blackness, with the only light we can see being the five instrument read-outs that are like alien eyes glowing red...Today the spectra strop parted with a "large bang." Jerry had to have another trip to the "Sky Bar" (masthead) to replace the strop. The whip lash at the top of the rig is enormous in heavy air, and is even greater in light air as the seas take over the motion of Chessie."

OK. So I guess November was a bit rough. But that was last month, wasn't it? And from now on it's smooth sailing? No, not exactly. A worse leg is still ahead of them. On February 1 the fleet heads back to the Southern Ocean, even farther south than before, massive waves and giant winds and skittering among the icebergs in the frigid wet. From Auckland around the Horn to the eastern coast of South America, in boats built for speed and little else---certainly not for comfort.

Why am I dwelling on these people who are sailing so far away, halfway around the world? Because our speaker for the January meeting is a representative of Whitbread Chesapeake, who will show us the latest videos from the fleet, tell us about local participation in this race, and explain what events are planned to welcome these same people and this same fleet in April, when for the first time ever the Whitbread will be here, in our water, racing up the Chesapeake to Baltimore.

Well. I have been neglecting my drink while I wrote, and it clearly needs my attention now. But there are other things to say before I go.

This is the my first issue of Channels as Commodore, and I already feel the need to thank the 1998 SCOW board for their dedication. We held our first meeting in early December, nearly a month before the start of our official terms. At that meeting we planned the calendar for 1998, and you should be able to find it elsewhere in this Channels: cut it out and tape it to your wall, or magnet it to the refrigerator.

And note that the calendar starts immediately: there is a planned January social event, an ice skating excursion. Denise Derry provides details inside. So come join us---take the chance when it arises to throw off the grey restraints of winter. And between those chances, be grateful for quiet, warm shelter and the occasional good beer.

January 12th Program: Socializing starting at 6:30, Meeting at 7:30 American Legion Post, 400 Cameron Street in Old Town, Alexandria. Take I-495 around toward Fairfax, VA, and exit on Route 50 West. Approximately 3 miles, just before Fairfax Circle, turn left onto Pickett Road, at the stoplight (Ruby Tuesday is on the corner). In approximately 1 mile you'll see the Arena on your left. Lots of additional parking is behind the arena if there aren't spaces in front.

Alternate path is to take I-495 to Route 236/Lil' River Turnpike, travel west approximately 3 miles, turn right at the Fair City Mall, onto Pickett Road. The Arena is approximately .5 miles on the right.
