Commodore's Log

This month's column is the last opportunity I will have as Commodore to promote stronger member volunteerism in SCOW. As you have heard me say many times in this column, our viability and continuity as an organization is founded principally on the voluntary contributions of time, skill, and enthusiasm provided by our members.

Many long-time and new members are still uncertain about what volunteer opportunities are available to them in SCOW, so I hope the information in this column will lead to more of you "finding a niche" in the administration and activities of the club. Most of these committees and teams require experienced members with knowledge of the club's rules, programs and resources, but they all also need new members to gain experience and become the experienced members of the future. We all check those boxes on our annual membership application but don't wait from someone to call you! Pursue your own interests by contacting the program or persons discussed below.

On page 3 of your 2006 Membership Directory, you will find a list of committees and volunteer teams that present a wide variety of opportunities to serve the club. Members who serve on these committees and teams are appointed by the Board. But don't wait for the Officers or Directors to ask you to serve; contact them and offer to help! "New blood" is needed to relieve members who have served for multiple administrations.

The **ChaNNels Team** needs not only an editor and a computer layout person, it needs people willing to submit pictures, information, articles, and reports to keep the membership informed. So those of you who always wanted to try your hand as a journalist or gossip columnist, this is your big chance!

This team, along with the Email and Web Team (below), is critical to the timely exchange of information within the Club. Contact Karen Szymczak (2006 editor) or Wayne Williams (2006 layout guru).

The **New Member Coordinators** are generally people who understand what it feels like to be new to a group and are willing to help make that experience less difficult for others. They are willing to answer email inquiries about SCOW, greet visitors at Social Sail, and help with orientation for new members at monthly meetings. If you don't know much about SCOW programs and activities when you start, you certainly will "know it all" by the end of the year! Contact Jan Earle, Melissa Ennis, or former Commodores.

The **Email and Web Team** is generally handled by members who have done this job year after year. But they also welcome assistance because it's a big job and because we frequently need to update our services. Those of you with website and email design and troubleshooting skills are especially encouraged to step forward and help out here. Contact Jeff Teitel (Postmaster), Peg O'Laughlin (Webmaster), or Monika O'Connor (Website guru).

The **Boatique program** is the source of our t-shirts, golf shirts, jackets, and hats with SCOW insignia. Bill Bernhards works for a company that specialized in these items and has handled the orders for several years now. However, he can always use a helper to answer inquiries, promote the items, collect orders, and deliver the items. Contact Bill if you wish to assist him.

The **Boat Asset Committee**, as defined in the Bylaws, consists of a minimum of six club members, including the Maintenance Director, one other Board member, and two club members who own their own boats. (continued on page 2)

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Committee members meet three to four times a year or as needed, submit a year-end report to the Board, and may spend time evaluating club boats or boats considered for purchase. Contact Jay Weitzel (2006 Chairman), John Roland, or Barry Dunsmoor.

The **Training and Skipper Certification Committee**, as defined in the Bylaws, consists of a minimum of five club members, including at least one past Training Director. It advises and assists the Training and Skipper Directors in establishing the standards and procedures for training and skipper certification, for appointment and removal of trainers and checkout skippers, and for the review of accidents or violations of boat use privileges. The committee meets as needed – usually about three to four times a year. Members with experience or knowledge of teaching or training, water safety, sailing curriculum, or human resources issues are encouraged to volunteer. The **Audit Committee** is defined by the Bylaws and conducts a once-per-year audit of the club's financial records. It is usually composed of the Chairman (Auditor) and one or two assistants. The annual audit is usually conducted no later than February or March (for the previous year) and takes the committee about a day. A written report is presented to the Board, with a summary published in ChaNNels. Members with bookkeeping or other financial skills and experience are encouraged to serve on this committee. The **Bylaws Committee**, headed by former Commodore Jay Weitzel, updated our Bylaws during the past few years so that there was very little to do during 2006 other than advise the Board. However, there appears to be one or two issues to be considered during 2007 that will require the work of a Bylaws Committee. Those of you with previous club administration experience or legal knowledge would be valuable here. Contact Jay Weitzel.

The Maintenance Bosuns Team assists the Maintenance Director and provides timely, personalized care for each of SCOW's boats and the storage lockers. Each boat has a Chief Bosun who leads a Bosun Team, evaluating maintenance needs and conducting repairs and upkeep between the regular maintenance days in April, July and October.

In addition, there are usually two or three "floating bosuns" who do as-needed maintenance on any of the boats, as well as a "locker bosun." This is a wonderful opportunity to learn to do simple boat repairs, but members with specialized skills (motors, woodworking, and painting) are needed, too. Contact Wayne Williams (2006 Maintenance Director), John Roland, Lynne Russillo, or Alice Starcke (locker bosun).

The **Racing Committee** advises and assists the Racing Director and the Training and Skipper Directors in establishing the standards and procedures for skippers and crew who race on SCOW boats, and for the review of accidents or violations of racing rules. Committee members meet to discuss issues and make decisions as well as planning racing crew hands-on training workshops for club members. Members with experience or knowledge of racing are encouraged to volunteer but racing experience is not required. Contact Bill Bernhards or Barry Dunsmoor.

The Membership Directory Team assists the Membership Coordinator to compile, format, print, and mail the club membership directory. Current practice involves mailing a new directory in June and providing a New Members and Update supplement in the fall. Most assistance involves proofreading, contacting members to verify questionable information, and mailing preparation. Contact Monika O'Connor.

The Nominating Committee, as defined by the Bylaws, consists of at least five club members, including at least one past Commodore, one member of the Board, and one non-Board Club member. Beginning in August, the committee members begin scouting the membership for candidates for the next year's Board, and after confirming the candidates, the team prepares and mails the ballots. The committee counts the ballots at the November Annual Membership Meeting and announces the elected Officers and Directors. The team also prepares ballot initiatives for changes to the Bylaws. This is a great opportunity to get to know other members and to participate in the electoral process. Contact Jan Earle, Steve Linke, Barb Ullman, or Bill Bernhards.

The **Tutoring Coordinator** assists the Training and Skipper Directors by administrating a program that links members who have passed their written skipper exam (skipper candidates) with skippers who are willing to take them out in the boats to practice for their water exam. (continued on page 3)

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It primarily involves email messaging. Contact Ed Venere (2006 Tutoring Coordinator).

The **Photo Site Coordinator** collects members' electronic pictures of club events and posts them on the SCOW Photo Site. Both website maintenance and photo collection and identification assistance are needed. Contact Mike Rothenberg (2006 Photo Site Coordinator).

Finally, each of the Directors – Training, Skipper, Social, Maintenance, Racing, and River/Bay – also needs assistants to help carry their heavy workloads. Sometimes they need help only for a special event, such as a party, a training course, a checkout day, a maintenance day, race registration or committee boat, or a raft-up. But each also has work that you could help with on a regular basis throughout the year, like records update, inventory, skippering, and teaching or tutoring. Even picking up the club's mail at the post office box (in DC) or updating the marina bulletin board on a regular basis would be very helpful. As with any job, reliability and follow-through are more important than skills and experience. Contact the officers or the directors if you have time you would like to contribute to SCOW.

I have really enjoyed my year as Commodore of SCOW and I feel highly honored to have been chosen to serve during this 40th Anniversary year. I wish to thank sincerely all those members who contributed their time and skills to make this year so successful and so memorable. I look forward to sharing with all of you the beginning of SCOW's 5th decade of fun on the water and on the land.



Sailing Terminology Review

Just a few terms to review while you wait for warm weather and a chance to go sailing again.

Bitter End – End of a line away form the working end

Ebb tide – Outgoing tide

Flood tide – Incoming tide

Gunwale – Upper edge of a boat's topsides

Ketch – A two-masted boat with the mainmast taller than the aft (mizzen) mast. On a ketch, the mizzen traditionally is located forward of the rudder post

Painter – A dinghy's bow line

Pinching – Sailing too close to the wind so that the boat slows down

Sloop – boat with one mast setting a triangular main and jib

Definitions are from *The Sailing Doctor, The Essential Shipboard Companion* by Martin Luray.
