Commodore's Log



It is now election season! It is not ours to wonder at the year long tussle between Hillary and Barack or wonder if Fred Thompson will run. It **is** ours to wonder who will run for the 2008 SCOW Board and it is **your** chance to volunteer! The elections are in November 2007, a full year before the Presidential elections, so act fast!

The Board is an exemplary group of SCOW members distinguished by their willingness to contribute to SCOW. The Commodore (head of the Board) serves two functions, first , boldly lead the club into the future and, second, fill in on the smaller tasks when needed (including respond to emails and finding volunteers). The Vice-Commodore is responsible for the programs at the general meetings, filling in where needed, and serving as a ex-officcio member of various committees. Ex-officio means having a say just because of the title (sort of).

The Treasurer does all things money-wise and a few other things (big checks need a second signature, so this position is not all-powerful, just all-important). The Treasurer also gets to be custodian of the SCOW Incorporation Seal. The Secretary takes minutes at the Board meetings and is officially responsible for the

membership list. However, much of the membership list maintenance has been handled by the Membership Coordinator (Henry Cheng this year). So the Secretary also helps out with other things (you are probably getting the idea by now).

So the Officers of the club are the Commodore, Vice-Commodore, Secretary, and Treasurer. These are the Board members who run for specific Board positions (according to the By-Laws). The other six-to-eight members of the Board are called Directors. Traditionally, the Directors are responsible for the following functions: Training, Skipper Certification, Social Activities, Maintenance, Racing, River Activities, and Bay Activities. In return they get the title of Training Director, Social Director, ... you get the idea.

Officially the Directors do not run for specific Director positions; they run for the position of Director. Officially, the Commodore assigns the functions above to the Directors "in any manner and combination that the Commodore

deems most effective." In addition, "the Commodore may also assign Directors to perform such other functions as may be necessary to carry out the affairs and program of the club" (that is a legalistic way of saying the Directors also help out with other things). This approach allows flexibility in case the needs of the club change.

For the past few years, candidates for the Director positions specify, before the election, what functions they would like to perform. Then the electorate knows what function the Director is expected to perform and the candidates can clarify their interest and expectations. The six-to-eight candidates with the largest number of votes get to be Directors. This has worked in the past and we will use I again this year. However, two candidates with different approaches cannot compete directly for the same function. (We may amend the By-Laws on this point, stay tuned!)

The election process is organized by the Nominating Committee which recruits one or more candidates for each position, accepts nominations from the membership, prepares the ballot, and runs the election. This year the Nominating Committee is Veri Crain, Jan Earle, Rhonda Glassman, Karen Szymczak, Mike Rothenberg, and George Umberger, .

So what is this "six-to-eight" thing? Each year the Board picks a number between 6 and 8 (sounds easy doesn't it). This is the number of Directors to be elected. This year the number is 7.

So, if you are interested in running for one of the 7 Director positions on the ballot and serving any of the following functions:

Training Director: working with SCOW trainers organizing the SCOW classes, Skipper Director, keeping track of who is a qualified skipper, helping to grade written tests, and working with check-out skippers, Social Director: organizing social activities and associated volunteers.

Social Director: organizing social activities and associated volunteers

Maintenance Director: managing maintenance of the boats and recruiting help to keep the boats ship-shape, Racing Director: organizing the SCOW racing activities, both Flying Scot races and SCOW participation in other races,

River Director: directing the daily tide in the river (just seeing if you were paying attention) and organizing river events, sails, raft-ups, etc.,

Bay Director: organizing various activities and raft-ups on the Chesapeake Bay.

Then

Contact the Nominating Committee Make it clear what Director position you are interested in, and Complete a candidate's statement for the ballot.

If you are not sure if you want to run, talk to a member of the Nominating Committee, the current Board, or a past Board.

Finally, if a member of the nominating Committee contacts you about possibly running, please give the request a positive consideration.

I will not claim that serving on the Board is not time consuming. However, it can be rewarding and the tasks can be managed. It is a chance to shape the future of SCOW. What is your vision of what SCOW can become? How would you like to help?

Please consider running for the Board and: May the best Sailor Win.



<u>UPCOMING GUEST SPEAKERS –</u> <u>SCOW GENERAL MEETING</u>

All Monthly Meetings are at American Legion Hall, 400 Cameron Street, Alexandria, 2nd Monday of every month (except December), Social Hour - 6:30PM; New member Orientation 7:00PM; Program and Meeting - 7:30PM.

Sept. 10 speaker: Brandon Peloquin, Marine Program Leader at the Baltimore/Washington DC National Weather Forecast Office is responsible for leading the Marine Program that issues forecasts across the Maryland Chesapeake Bay and the Tidal Potomac River. He will discuss the process for issuing marine forecasts, frequency of updates, sources of information, criteria for small craft advisories, and will field questions relating to marine forecasts. Those with an interest in our club's severe weather policies are especially encouraged to attend this event.

Oct. 8 Speaker: Len Zuza, SCOW member, will discuss the mission of the Southern Maryland Oyster Cultivation Society (SMOCS), "Cleaning Local Waters, One Oyster at a Time". The mission of SMOCS is to reduce water pollution in the creeks along the lower Patuxent River by raising a very large number of native oysters in selected locations. Goals of the organization are: to raise as many ovsters as possible; help people who do not live near tidal water find waterfront owners willing to let others raise oysters on their docks; support the scientific study of ovsters and their habitat to learn more about the relationship between oysters and their habitat; work with youth groups, school systems and community organizations to share information on the environmental benefits of growing oysters; work with local and state officials to enact programs that support ovster restoration; help members obtain ovster spat and the equipment needed to raise them from a variety of sources. Len will demonstrate the filtration power of these ovsters right before your very eyes! Any sailor interested in clean, pollution-free water should not miss this presentation. RESULTS OF THE DANSCHWEIDA SKIPPER SURVEY

Recently a survey was administered to skippers and trainers of our Flying Scots, in order to assess the sentiments associated with Danschweida's new "Turbo-Scot" rigging. For those not familiar with the new rigging, the modifications include: rope halyards to replace the original wire winch system, new stowing methods for the sails that keep them stowed on the boat, a lower trailer, and a lock-box on the trailer to hold the sign-out book. The modifications were intended to make the boat quicker to launch and put away, and also to expose skippers to a new rigging system. The results are in! In total, 17 complete surveys were received, and 7 skippers opted not to complete a survey but did submit comments, for a total of 24 responses. Of the completed surveys, 14 respondents were skippers and 3 respondents were both skippers and trainers. Here are the results:

- Do you find sending-off easier or more difficult with the new configuration? Easier – 9 More Difficult – 6 No response – 2
- Do you find putting the boat away easier or more difficult with the new configuration? Easier – 10 More Difficult – 5 No response – 2
- Do you feel that the new rigging serves the overall club uses of the boat better or worse than before?

 Worse 8
 No response 1
- 4. How would you like to see the Flying Scots rigged in the future? Leave boats rigged as/is - 5 Repeat Turbo Rigging on other Scots - 4 Return Danschweida to original config. - 7 Undecided - 1

As one can glean from these results, there are mixed feelings about the new Turbo-Scot rigging on Danschweida. The Skipper and Training Committee met in July to discuss the survey results and make a recommendation to the board. Considering the fact that while many skippers prefer the new rigging, and a similar number of skippers prefer the original rigging, the recommendation was to leave the boats rigged as-is, i.e. maintain the new rigging on Danschweida and do not repeat this process on other boats, so as to serve the interests of both parties.

Some favorable comments for the Turbo-Scot configuration include: "I like the longer axle and larger tires – easier to get in boat when on trailer"; "new rigging can introduce Scot skippers to cruiser-type rigging"; "eliminates the need for a winch handle"; "easier to raise and lower sails"; "new rigging maximizes time on the water since you can launch and put away quicker".

Some unfavorable comments for the rigging include: "the mechanics of rigging ought to be standardized, stay with the factory setup"; "its more difficult to flake the main sail than removing and stowing it"; "new rigging is too hard on the hands and difficult to properly tension and raise sails"; "there is a lot of excess halyard that becomes tangled and messy"; "I don't see the benefits of most of the changes"; "this is not a club dedicated to racing, Scots should be rigged in a standard fashion to facilitate skills improvement in Scot sailing, the Scot is an excellent boat for club purposes with the factory rig".





Fowl Weather Raft-Up -October 20 & 21



There are no guarantees in Life...

I can't promise that the weather will be nice, that there will be wind, that you won't get seasick, that every piece of equipment will be functioning, or that the raftup won't be broken up due to approaching weather. I can't guarantee sailing all the way to the anchorage, that we won't run aground somewhere, or that the engine won't pick the worst possible time to die and then refuse to restart. I can't even be sure that raindrops won't choose the spot just above your berth to enter the boat. If certainties are important, sailboat cruising is probably not for you.

However, if you are willing to be flexible, and take whatever comes along, there are lots of benefits to Bay cruising: Leisurely sails drifting along without a care in the world, thrilling beats with the spray in your face, beautiful runs downwind behind a colorful, floating spinnaker. Happy hours spent enjoying drinks and snacks with friends. Gourmet meals prepared aboard. Peaceful mornings in a secluded wooded anchorage, waterfowl emerging from the rising mists. Afternoon swims or hikes though wildlife sanctuaries. Casting a line out to see if you can catch dinner. Musical interludes, interesting new places, exciting stories to share. Midnight conga lines to the tunes of Aba, impromptu maintenance sessions, helping someone repair their (fill in just about any piece of nautical equipment here) for the trip back...

These are just a few of the experiences from SCOW Bay raftups. All that is required is to answer an email, and you can be added to the crew list for one of our Bay events. Include a brief description of your sailing experience and interests as well as last-minute contact information (cell number) and you may be called if one of the Bay skippers has room for additional crew. There is no guarantee of getting a berth, but the chances are pretty good if you persist.

All we ask: If you offer to come along, take the commitment seriously. The skipper is counting on having a certain number of crew to help sail the boat. They are planning for the provisions you said you'd provide. They are trying to leave the dock on schedule so as to arrive on time (to set the anchor, avoid bad weather, arrive before dark, catch a tide, etc.)

Check your calendar in advance. Ask questions and decide if this is something you really want to do. Discuss health considerations, schedule, directions, etc. Sure, something important may come up at the last minute, but try to anticipate and provide as much advance notice as you can. Bay skippers spend a lot of time, money, and effort keeping their boats going, and want to enjoy them as much as possible. They may be disappointing others who were hoping for the spot that you got.

I'll close with a few reminders (thanks to Len Zuza) of how to be good crew. Please refer to the "Ways to make the Skipper Happy". (on the previous page) Hope to see you on the Bay. Fair winds, Jack Schwartz s/v Odyssey
