MORE OPPORTUNITIES FOR CLUB VOLUNTEERS

It's time for some New Year Resolutions. Pick one, any one. Just (don't) say no...to all of them.

SCOW has some traditional community involvement events and some standing committees. A few require a bit of liaison and publicity work. We are calling on all of you, the 400+ members of SCOW, to step forward to head up or help. The folks that did these activities last year deserve a rest and unless someone steps forward to lead, these activities may not get done, or may not get done very well. If you know something about them, or have interest and would like to know more, send an email to Steve Linke (commodore@scow.org) and ask for details. Or maybe you have another activity you'd like to see your club take on. Contact Steve with the ideas (and a willingness to get it going).

Alexandria Red Cross Weekend Festival – June, Old Town Alexandria. We take a Flying Scot to Old Town and set up an information exhibit on SCOW, manned throughout the weekend days and evenings -- by SCOW members. We draw in lots of new members this way. Good way to meet folks, both in the club and at the festival. Good way to learn what it takes to trailer a boat with a mast down the parkway, a-la Smokey and the bandit...Check with Thom Unger for details.

Leukemia Cup Regatta – The object of this race is to raise as much cash as we can for the Leukemia Society. This is now a SCOW tradition and famously dominated by The Five Skippers, who set a tough standard in fund-raising for this event. But your fund-raising problems are already largely solved. What we need most for SCOW is a point of contact to get and distribute information and help allocate the club boats, based on who raises the most money, for this mid-September race. This is an excellent charity and great PR for SCOW. George Umberger and Dale Eager are good people to talk with for more details. Phil Barbara will help.

National Maritime Heritage Foundation – SCOW tries to help with their need for trainers on the Anacostia River one night a week. We need a person to help identify SCOW volunteers who have been doing this and continue the tradition. Again, the need is for a contact person. Len Zuza will help a lot with this and has more details.

Special Olympics – SCOW has participated for several years in this very worthwhile event where we take part in sail training of individuals with development disabilities. For four weeks each June, we train and mentor these athletes on our Flying Scots and participate in specially planned races. Standing SCOW Committees – We need members for Training Committee, Boat Asset Committee, and Racing Committee. Greetings. I am taking over the position of Maintenance Director from John Roland, my mentor and hero. John has done a great job and has left me with well-organized records and information, and he continues to guide me. He also has assured me that if I can work on a bicycle, I can work on a Flying Scot. Thank you, John.

I am planning to add a few things to the maintenance program so that it is a little more manageable and also to offer more structured maintenance training to SCOW members.

Maintenance Teams

Cruiser maintenance will be separated from Scot maintenance in that each cruiser will have a maintenance team, lead by a bosun and a co-bosun who will be responsible for coordinating the cruiser's repairs and maintenance. The cruisers can have separate maintenance days, if the bosuns want to do that. We can still work on all five boats on maintenance days, but don't have to. Cruiser bosuns may want to have cruiser maintenance workshops for their teams. Cruiser skippers in particular, please consider joining one of the cruiser maintenance teams.

Scot bosuns and co-bosuns will form the core of the Scot Maintenance Team. I'd like to have a Scot bosun workshop so that bosuns and co-bosuns know how to strip down the Scots and put them back together, as well as what things to check—like rivets falling out of booms—(your maintenance director would like to know these things too).

SCOW offers a great opportunity to learn ALL about boats. All suggestions and volunteers are welcome. If you have expertise in boat maintenance and repair, we'd like to tap that. Please contact me at maintenance@scow.org to get involved.

Maintenance Expert Mentoring

At the joint board meeting in December, we talked about a maintenance expert mentoring program. We ask those of you who have your own boats and have expertise to ask for volunteers from the club when you need help with work on your boats so that we can develop more repair experts. 
