Notes From the Boat Yard John Roland

Fleet Status

As ChaNNels goes to press, all of our boats are operational. Psycho has a non-functioning steaming light and shouldn't be used at night until it's fixed. Danschweida has a non-racheting ratchet block on her port side.

If you haven't gotten the word yet, the Flying Scots will be relocated. Phil Geishert, the marina director, needs the space where they were stored for access to the ramp and equipment staging during the renovation of the marina. He will relocate them in available dry slips attempting to keep them as close to the cranes as possible. They won't necessarily be together but you should be able to find them with a bit of looking. Please return them to the slip where you found them after use.

On-going and Upcoming Projects

Psycho's steaming light

On Saturday Nov 15 we determined that the wiring at the mast-mounted light socket had parted and the wires had dropped down inside the mast. This repair will be a significant project that requires dropping the mast, re-running the wiring and re-raising the mast. Probably a full day's work requiring 6-8 people including at least one person who has dropped Psycho's mast before.

Thom Unger suggested postponing it until the spring maintenance day and I'm inclined to agree unless a significant number of people want her fixed earlier. She is fine for daysailing until the light is fixed.

Thanks to Donna Cohen and Thom Unger who went up the mast and to Jack Sherman, Mike Clifford and Kevin Roland who provided support from the deck.

Danschweida's Ratchet Block

A quick look on maintenance day indicates that this is more than a bolt-on-the-new-part operation. Two of the three screws holding the block to the deck appear to have stripped the threads in whatever they are screwed into. This might be the fiberglass deck or a wood block under the deck. I've contacted Flying Scot to determine what is involved. When I have a better idea of how to proceed, I'll call for some support and set a time to take care of this. Danschweida is also usable in her current state.

Topic of the Month

Usually this will consist of an article or suggestion for improving the care and feeding of our boats. This isn't my personal soapbox. I encourage all members to contribute suggestions for projects or improvements in the ways in which we use the boats.

Jay Weitzel's article, Caring For Our Club's Sails in last month's ChaNNels is a great example. If you want to write under your own byline, as Jay did, that's fine. If you just want to provide an idea or outline, send me your suggestions and I'll add them to my topic list. This month, I'd like to discuss some of my plans as SCOW's new Maintenance Director.

When I started getting involved in maintenance activities this summer I was frustrated by the unavailability of tools and parts to work on the Fly Scots. Each of the cruisers has an on-board tool kit and an assortment of spare parts. I plan to set up a Scot tool kit and keep it in the sail locker. It will contain basic hand tools and a set of spare parts for common Flying Scot repairs. I welcome your suggestions for the contents of this kit. *(continued on page 5)*

Several members have approached me expressing a desire to become more involved with maintenance projects. I have two avenues to allow members to participate in maintenance activities.

I will continue the system of bosuns we used last year where each bosun is the lead person for maintenance and repair of one of our fleet. There are no requirements for a bosun other than the desire to participate, but I would suggest that those considering becoming a bosun be a skipper and regular sailor on the type of boat they want to care for. In addition, I need a locker bosun to take care of our two lockers in the marina.

If you are interested in becoming a bosun, send an email to maintenance@scow.org and let me know what boat, class of boat or locker you want to work with.

For those seeking a less demanding maintenance experience, I plan to announce unscheduled maintenance activities in ChaNNels and by email to all@scow.org inviting interested parties to participate. I've done this for hurricane preparation, restoration, and the attempted repair to Psycho's steaming lamp and the response has been gratifying. In each case, I've gotten sufficient volunteers to do an excellent job and I believe the participants have had a rewarding and educational experience.

I'll also start maintaining an on-call list of folks who have expressed a desire to participate in maintenance projects. Send an email to maintenance@scow.org and let me know of your interest and what skills and areas of special interest you have.

Regarding a maintenance course which has also been suggested, I will be exploring this idea with the Training and Skipper Directors and committee methods of incorporating maintenance and repair into our training program. Options may include a separate class and/or the addition of maintenance / repair sections to some of our existing classes.

Skipper Director News Steve Linke

As we said at the Hail & Farewell, thanks to all the checkout skippers and others who helped this year.

In 2003 we added about 47 new SCOW skippers to the rolls. Many other passed written and even on-water checkouts but did not get water safety certificates done, or they just decided to wait for spring.

As most know, to be a new skipper and take out our boats requires a written, an on-water and a water safety certificate. Then you can pay a small fee and sail on SCOW boats as much as you want. I agree, it is getting cold. But spring will soon be here and warm breezes will beckon. Be ready.

Time for some new year resolutions for 2004.

Make sailing a priority. If you do not, you will never sail around the world or in a sunny locale for a winter vacation. This part of your life you can control.

If you are a skipper, plan to get out there on warm days. (But wear a life jacket cause the water can be cold even on the warm days.)

If you are not yet a skipper, get going. Get the written requirements done over the winter and be ready to go in the spring. The new sailing year starts up on 1 April and the boats will be there. What are you waiting for? This club idea is the best way to avoid pouring money into a hole in the water.

Washington Sailing Marina Construction Report George Umberger

It has begun. The long planned and awaited renovation of our slips and docks at the Marina commenced on November 10. Marina Manager Phil Geishert reports the following:

General construction is scheduled to end by March 1 of next year with ancillary punch list items completed by April 30, including all utilities restorations. An experienced marine contractor from the West River area has charge of this project.

Construction staging areas have been set up near the cranes and also near G dock. A note of caution is offered here; the staging area near G dock hampers visibility entering and exiting the Restaurant parking lot, so please enter and exit this area carefully.

Our Flying Scots have been temporarily relocated to dry slips C-1, D-14, and D-0 (end of the row).

There will be a new and improved double ramp installed at the current ramp location next to the cranes. On the west side of the peninsula, eight new docks will replace the current seven with the new A dock serving as a wave attenuator and for transient slips. Docks will be re-lettered so Psycho and Rebecca will likely be at the end of the new G dock. The footprint of the docks will shift slightly and all old pilings will be removed.

Phil and crew will keep us posted on the location of our club and personal boats as they may need to be moved for new dock installation. And ferry assistance will be provided if any boats need to be moored temporarily in the lagoon.

Keep your fingers crossed for reasonable meteorological parameters (that's weather conditions to any landlubbers out there) since the weather can alter and delay the planned schedule. Please contact the Marina office or SCOW officers if you have questions or need assistance.

Thanks for their efforts and best of luck to Phil and his able crew as they oversee this important project!
