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Volunteers Make the Difference

Thanks to the volunteer spirit of club members, we continue to improve the SCOW Fleet.

Beginning with our spring Maintenance Day in March, we initiated several upgrades to both the cruiser and the Flying Scot fleet. We continue to upgrade the club's sailboats on a project by project basis.

A jib roller furler was previously installed on Topaz and recently cleats were installed to assist in using the new roller furler. In addition, excess equipment has been removed from the cruisers and from the dock box to make the cruisers more usable and less cluttered. A boat cleaning kit is being placed in the dock box to assist in maintaining both cruisers.

We began installing storage hammocks on the Flying Scots to allow us to store life jackets off the floor. Some of the anchorage blocks for those storage hammocks have come loose so we are in the process of reconnecting those anchor blocks with stronger epoxy adhesive. Life vests stored on the floor can stay wet for long periods; get dirty and even moldy so the hammocks are helpful in keeping the club's equipment in good shape.

The updated Skipper Information File added flashlights to the list of required equipment on the Flying Scots so we have included LED flashlights and put extra flashlights in the Sail Locker. We have also purchased loud whistles for the Flying Scots to comply with US Coast Guard safety requirements that sound making devices be heard for up to one-half mile away.

A boat cleaning kit for the Flying Scots is being maintained in the Sail Locker to assist in removing scuff marks from the hulls. A new metal cleat to secure the centerboard line was added to Susie Q to replace the worn wooden cleat next the centerboard drum. The new metal cleat is being checked out by several skippers before the wooden cleats on other Flying Scots are replaced.

The tillers on the club's boats are continually exposed to the weather and need refinishing on a periodic schedule. To avoid out-of-service time, SCOW has an extra tiller which allows us to periodically replace a tiller so that a volunteer can take the weathered tiller home to sand it down and refinish it as time permits.

There are plenty of maintenance tasks that can be completed on your schedule so don't think that you have to rearrange your personal schedule to volunteer. If you would like to make a contribution of your time to the Club please let us know. Please note that all projects are initiated by an idea or suggestion from a member so if there is something that you have observed that would make the fleet better or our process run smoother please let us hear from you.

Updates to SCOW SIFS and Exams – Thanks to Those Involved

The SCOW Skipper Information Files for the Flying Scots and Cruisers, the Flying Scot written exam and the Skipper Requirements and Boat Use Policy have just been updated and approved by the board. An updated Cruiser written exam is expected shortly.

Many thanks go to all the members of the Training and Skipper Certification Committee for their efforts to update these documents as well as to those on the Boat Asset Committee, maintenance team, trainers and board members for their review and comments. And special thanks to Joe DePoorter for taking the lead on updating the Flying Scot SIF; Jay Weitzel for the Cruiser SIF and Skipper Requirements and Boat Use Policy; John Rogers for the Flying Scot written exam; and Mike Rothenberg for overseeing the updating of all the documents.

This is the first update for these documents in many years. Below is a brief overview of some of the changes. Skippers and crew should read each of these to be sure they are up on the latest SCOW procedures and policy for our boats. This information can be located under the “Bylaws and Policies” tab of the website at www.scow.org:

Flying Scot SIF

1. The FS SIF has grown from 5 to 11 pages, and begins with an emphasis on “Safety First” and a new introduction and note, which serves to remind skippers of their responsibility to take pride in the club’s boats and leave them clean and in good repair.
2. It updates information on the club reservation and scheduling system.
3. It adds a “Personal Gear Checklist” based on a recent Channels article by Jan Earle, and lists new safety items (flashlight and throw line) now stowed on all club Flying Scots.
4. It goes into greater detail on Pre-Launching Procedures, Launching and using the new cranes, Rigging, Raising the Sails and Casting off, Under Way advice, Landing and Un-Rigging procedures, and Hauling-out and Securing.
5. Outlines a new docking procedure.
6. It also got a close review and update on what to do when going aground.
7. Based on a detailed write-up in Channels by George Umberger and Jim Klein, it includes instructions on the new Flying Scot reefing procedure.
8. Capsize information was also updated.
9. A list of Safe Havens was added as was a section on “Resources and References.”

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Cruiser SIF

1. Like the FS SIF, the Cruiser SIF begins with a note to remind skippers of their responsibility to take pride in the club's boats and leave them clean and in good repair.
2. It adds information on Topaz to the SIF and removes reference to Psycho, a club cruiser that was sold in 2008.
3. Updates information on procedures for use and care of the marine head on each boat.
4. Updates information on the operation of the motors on each boat and the battery switch that are important to know about to prevent inadvertent damage to the engines. It also notes the new location of the gas tank on Rebecca.
5. Includes safety and operating procedures for the butane stove on Topaz, and additional updates in the Safety Considerations and Operating Procedures sections.

SCOW Skipper Requirements and Boat Use Policy

1. Includes a major revision to the clubs boat scheduling procedure and includes information about the online Faces boat reservation system.
2. Expands the list of safety equipment on the Flying Scots, which now includes a flashlight and throw line.
3. Includes a list of safe havens

Basic Sailing Written Exam (formerly known as the Flying Scot written exam)

The basic sailing written exam also got a thorough review, with updates and revisions made to both the text and some of the test diagrams to correspond with the new FS SIF and Skipper Requirements and Boat Use Policy and to clarify some of the questions. Please note for those of you who have the former test under way, it will continue to be accepted up until 06.01.10.

The new test is available on the website under the member section (along with a copy of the existing cruiser test). If you've never logged in before, select "Forgot Password" and a temporary password will be emailed to you. If you're not set up as a member, feel free to contact the skipper director, skipper@scow.org. □
