Introduction to Wednesday Night Racing

What?

- Fun, informal racing practice
- Small-boats racing around buoys on the Potomac



Why?

- Skippers Great way to find and build crew
- New skippers Great way to try out racing before the more formal regattas
- Experienced skippers Refresh and fine tune your skills

Back to Wednesday Night Racing

When?

Every Wednesday from April 6th to September 28th. The first Wednesday in April through the last Wednesday in September, weather permitting.

Race time: Around 5:30 pm (Crew and skippers tend to gather around 4:30pm to rig the boats.)

Who?

- 6 Club-owned Flying Scots
- FS Fleet 203 (Privately owned Flying Scots)
- A few other small boats Lasers & Bucs

All skippers must be SCOW (or PRSA) members

All crew on club-owned boats must be SCOW members.



Experience? No racing experience needed. But you should be comfortable on a small boat and be able to follow the skipper's instructions.

How?

Skippers:

- No reservations are necessary. No preorganization of crew is necessary. Club boats become available at 4:00pm and may be taken on a first-come-first-serve basis at the Marina.
- Please check in with Dick Kerr near the cranes. Let him know which boat you are taking and how many crew you can take.



 Please take extra crew when necessary. Remember the new crew member you take this year, could become a skipper, boat owner, or racing director next year.

Potential Crew:

- Gather near the cranes around 4:30.
- Dick Kerr takes names of potential crew and matches them to skippers. Crew are assigned on a first-come-first-serve basis with some consideration for experience. The earlier you arrive the better your chances of getting on a boat. (Usually we are able to get everyone on a boat, but we cannot guarantee it.)

Weather

Weather updates on Monday or Tuesday
 (Dick Kerr sends out his weather analysis
 on <u>Friends of SCOW</u> (Unofficial Google groups)



- Cancellations: Bonnie sends out an email to all SCOW members (usually early Wednesday afternoon)
 - 'Organized racing is cancelled' or 'We'll call it at the docks' No announcement means that we plan to race.
- Occasionally we will reschedule for a Friday. If you would like to organize the Friday night race, please contact me.

Remember:

- Each boat must make their own decision whether to race or not. (RRS. 3)
- If organized racing is cancelled, boats may still sail and race on their own.

It's better to be on the shore wishing you were on the water than to be on the water wishing you were on the shore. (Dave Beckett)


Race Organization

Location

- 1st Choice The river between G7 and G7A (across from the old powerplant)
- 2nd Choice The WSM lagoon

Don't forget about hazards – shallow areas, vortexes, and day marker 10. (If you are new to WSM ask a local.)






Course

Usually Windward-leeward Start-Finish line is also the leeward gate mark.

- Round the windward mark to port
- Take the gate from the inside-out.

W2 = Windward-Leeward, 2 laps.



Marks

- Yellow drop marks
- Green navigational buoys, white no wake buoys





Communication

VHF Radio Channel 68

Starting Sequence


- 3 Minute sequence using a whistle blown over the radio
- Several quick short blasts Attention, we're about to start the start sequence
- Three blasts 3 minutes
- Two blasts 2 minutes
- One blast 1 minute
- One long blast start



Boats over the starting line early at the start signal must return and re-cross the start line, during which time they must keep clear of all other boats.

Rules

- Wednesday Night Racing is governed by the World Sailing's Racing Rules of Sailing 2021-2024 (There's a copy on the Race with SCOW page.)
- There is no referee on the race course.
- All racers are expected to self-referee and show good sportsmanship.
- If you foul another boat, take a penalty turn(s). If another boat fouls you, hail the other boat and call "Protest" or let it go.



Penalties

- A boat that fouls another boat shall take a **one turn penalty**, which includes one tack and one gybe in the same direction. This changes RRS 44.1.
- A boat that fouls another boat **within the zone** of any mark except a starting mark is required to take a **two turns penalty** to clear the foul.

Post-Race Discussion

- There is no protest committee for WNR.
- If you think there was a misunderstanding on the race course, talk about it at the picnic table after the race. *Friendly* discussion of the rules is a great way to help everyone learn. It's a lot easier to talk about these situations in person than to explain it on email.

A few other notes:

- If your boat arrives after racing has started, either join in the back of the fleet or hang out near the start line until the next race. (Try not to interfere with any boats that are racing.)
- If you retire early from racing, please radio race committee and let us know.
- If you want to keep sailing after racing has been ended, you can.
 Each boat makes their own decision about when to head in.



After racing

- Help pick up marks.
- Help put the boats away.
- Gather around the picnic table to talk about the night's racing and other topics. Let me know who won. Talk out any rules confusion.
- Share good photos
